NEW INVENTIONS - "TALK TO WRITE"



"Talk to Write" is an innovative AI-based device developed by Ajay H, an engineering graduate from Kerala, India. The tool converts spoken words into handwritten text on paper using a CNC pen plotter. It integrates a Raspberry Pi,

Arduino, and Python-based speech-to-text AI, making it a low-cost and accessible solution.

The main purpose of this invention is to assist people with physical disabilities, learning challenges, or neurological conditions who are unable to write by hand. By simply speaking, users can produce neat, handwritten notes on A4 sheets—making it a valuable tool in education, healthcare, and accessibility.

The project gained attention after

being showcased at the Ente Keralam Expo 2025 and has been widely appreciated for its potential to create inclusive, assistive technology. It also highlights how low-budget, DIY systems can make a real-world impact without relying on large-scale corporate backing.

However, some ethical concerns have been raised, particularly about misuse by students for automating assignments. Despite this, "Talk to Write" stands out as a meaningful step toward using AI and robotics for human empowerment and accessibility.
